- **"Pull the wool over someone's eyes"** – deceive someone.
- **"A little white lie"** – a harmless or trivial lie, especially one told to avoid hurting someone's feelings.
- **"The whole truth and nothing but the truth"** – being completely honest.
- **"The naked truth"** – the plain and unembellished truth.
- **"Stretching the truth"** – making something sound better or worse than it really is.
- **"Truth be told"** – used to admit something honestly.
- **"Lying through your teeth"** – telling a blatant lie without shame.
- **"Tell a tall tale"** – telling an exaggerated or unbelievable story.
