Love in literature

If you've ever been in love and felt tongue-tied and vulnerable, unable to say how you truly feel, then you could do worse than seek inspiration from the great writers of the nineteenth century. We think of them as reserved, but in truth, they really knew how to talk about love. The euphoria of infatuation, the self-sacrifice of devotion, and the joy of true love are all expressed in their immortal lines.

A From *Wuthering Heights* by Emily Brontë

'My love for Linton is like the foliage in the woods: time will change it, I'm well aware, as winter changes the trees. My love for Heathcliff resembles the eternal rocks beneath: a source of little visible delight, but necessary. Nelly, I am Heathcliff! He's always, always in my mind: not as a pleasure, any more than I am always a pleasure to myself, but as my own being.'

B From *The Woman in White* by Wilkie Collins

'Where is the woman who has ever really torn from her heart the image that has been once fixed in it by a true love? Books tell us that such unearthly creatures have existed – but what does our own experience say in answer to books?'

C From *Our Mutual Friend* by Charles Dickens

'You know what I am going to say. I love you. What other men may mean when they use that expression, I cannot tell; what I mean is, that I am under the influence of some tremendous attraction which I have resisted in vain, and which overmasters me. You could draw me to fire, you could draw me to water, you could draw me to the gallows, you could draw me to any death, you could draw me to anything I have most avoided, you could draw me to any exposure and disgrace. This and the confusion of my thoughts, so that I am fit for nothing, is what I mean by your being the ruin of me. But if you would return a favourable answer to my offer of myself in marriage, you could draw me to any good – every good – with equal force.'

D From *The Portrait of a Lady* by Henry James

'It has made me better, loving you ... it has made me wiser and easier, and — I won't pretend to deny — brighter and nicer and even stronger. I used to want a great many things before and to be angry that I didn't have them. Theoretically I was satisfied, as I once told you. I flattered myself I had limited my wants. But I was subject to irritation; I used to have morbid, sterile, hateful fits of hunger, of desire. Now I'm really satisfied, because I can't think of anything better.'

E From *A Tale of Two Cities* by Charles Dickens

'I wish you to know that you have been the last dream of my soul ... the sight of you with your father, and of this home made such a home by you, has stirred old shadows that I thought had died out of me ... In the hour of my death, I shall hold sacred the one good remembrance – and shall thank you and bless you for it – that my last avowal of myself was made to you, and that my name, and faults, and miseries were gently carried in your heart ... O Miss Manette, when the little picture of a happy father's face looks up in yours, when you see your own bright beauty springing up anew at your feet, think now and then that there is a man who would give his life, to keep a life you love beside you!'

F From *Jane Eyre* by Charlotte Brontë

'I have for the first time found what I can truly love – I have found *you*. You are my sympathy – my better self – my good angel – I am bound to you with a strong attachment. I think you good, gifted, lovely: a fervent, a solemn passion is conceived in my heart; it leans to you, draws you to my centre and spring of life, wraps my existence about you, and, kindling in pure, powerful flame, fuses you and me in one.'
