Topic: Concrete nouns and abstract nouns

1. A concrete noun names a person, place, or thing that can be perceived by one or more of the senses (sight, hearing, taste, touch, and smell).
2. An abstract noun names an idea, a feeling, a quality, or a characteristic.

Examples:

Concrete nouns	Telephone, teacher, popcorn, ocean, bridge, Jesse Jackson
Abstract nouns	Knowledge, patriotism, love, humor, self-confidence, beauty, competition.

Collective nouns

A collective noun is a word that names a group.

Examples:

People	Animals	Things
Audience	Pack	Cluster
Chorus	Litter	Collection
Committee	Brood	Fleet
Crew	Flock	Set
Faculty	Herd	Batch
Family	Pride	Bundle
