

Zero Conditional

- The Zero conditional is about something that is always true .
- Both verbs (If clause + Main Clause) are in the **Present Simple**: *"If he's not at home by six, I call the school."*
- You can use **When/If** in the zero conditional.
- **Imperatives** can be used in the main clause of the zero conditional, such as in: *"If you come home late, don't make any noise, please."*

First Conditional

- **The First Conditional** is about the **future** and describes situations that are **likely** to happen.
- The verb in the **"if" clause** comes in the **Present Simple** and the **main clause**, in the **future (will)** or yet, a modal (showing a degree of certainty): *"if you don't study for the exam, you may fail this term."*
- You have to use a comma to separate the *If clause* from the main clause when the if-clause comes first: *"If she arrives in time, we'll go to the cinema"*. If it is the other way around, we don't need the comma: *"We'll go to the cinema if she arrives in time."*
