



REPORTED SPEECH!

Let's practice Reported Speech in a traditional way.
However, can you identify when is it really necessary?



We know we can use reported speech when we want to repeat someone's words in an indirect way. However, in the video we can find the flight attendant saying:

"I just talked to the pilot and he said he is going to do his very best to stay in control of the plane"

Why is this not following the rule? Well, this is not grammatically incorrect. This use of the present simple implies that the pilot is scared at the moment the flight attendant is speaking. This is typical in this context where she is announcing something the pilot just said in an ongoing situation.

ASK, TELL AND SAY!



When using reported speech in English, the verbs **ask**, **tell**, and **say** have specific functions depending on the type of statement being reported.

- **Ask** is used for reporting questions or polite requests, often followed by "if", "whether", or a question word. For example: ***He asked if I liked coffee.*** / ***He asked me if I like coffee*** is also possible.
- **Tell** is used for giving commands, instructions, or sharing information, and it always includes the listener as an object. For example: ***She told me to finish my homework.*** Here ***She told to finish my homework*** is NOT possible.
- **Say** is used for general statements, and the listener is optional. For example: ***He said he was tired.***
