Famous innovators

William Caxton (1422–1491)

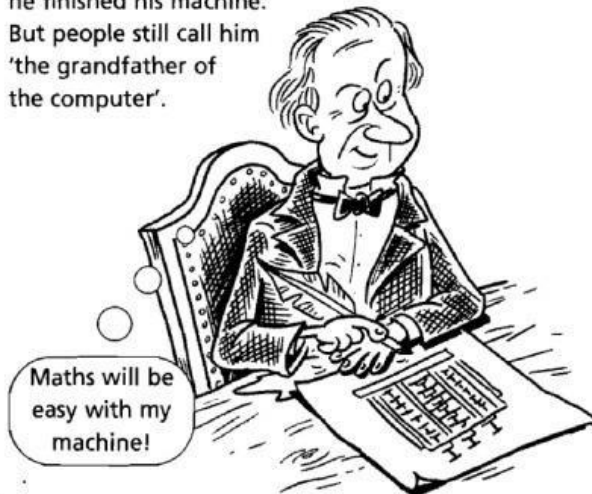
In 1469, Caxton translated* a French book into English. Lots of people in England wanted to read it. But in those days people copied* books by hand. That was very slow.



Caxton heard about Gutenberg's printing press in Germany. 'That's a good idea!' he said. In 1476, Caxton started the first printing press in England. He used his press to make about 100 books. Geoffrey Chaucer's 'Canterbury Tales*' was one of them.

Charles Babbage (1792–1871)

Charles Babbage was a mathematician* at Cambridge University*. He wanted to find the answers to maths problems quickly. He started to make a special machine* to do this. Another mathematician, Ada Lovelace, wrote the world's first computer program* for him. Babbage died before he finished his machine. But people still call him 'the grandfather of the computer'.



Alexander Graham Bell (1847–1922)

Bell came from Scotland, but he later went to live in the USA. He made one of the first telephones there in 1876. The first telephone call was to Bell's assistant* in the next room. Bell said, 'Mr.



What does he want now?

John Logie Baird (1888–1946)

The British call John Logie Baird 'the father of television.' In 1926 people saw 'pictures by radio' for the first time on one of Baird's TVs. In 1936 the BBC (the first British television company*) started to broadcast.* The early TVs were very big, but the picture was small and in black and white. They weren't like today's televisions!

In 1953, lots of British people wanted a TV. They wanted to watch Elizabeth II's coronation* on it. They sold a lot of televisions in Britain that year!
