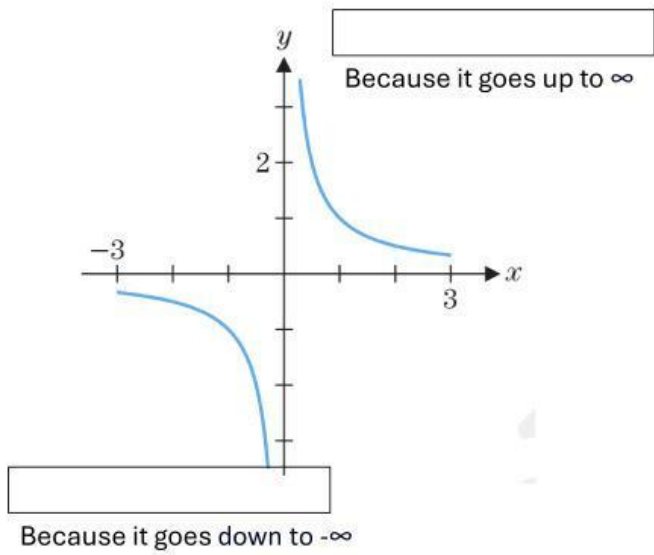

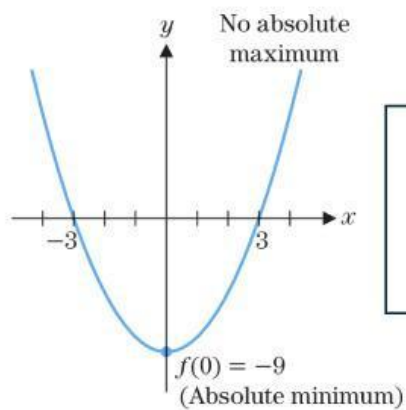

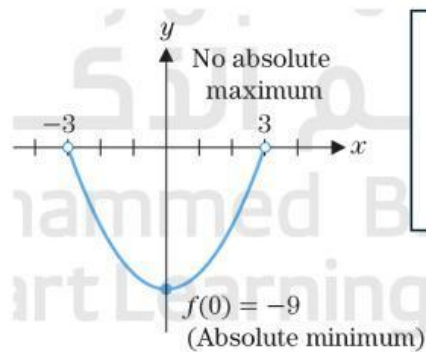

$$y = x^2 - 9 \text{ on } (-\infty, \infty)$$

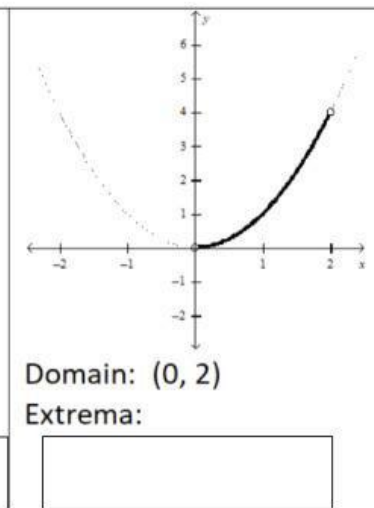
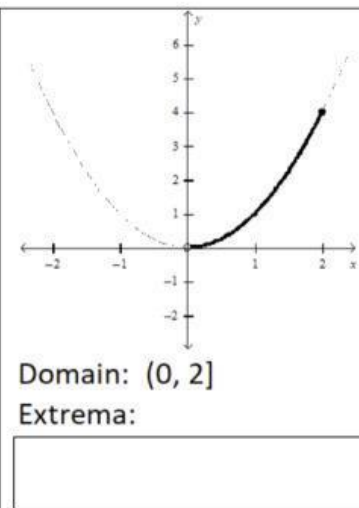
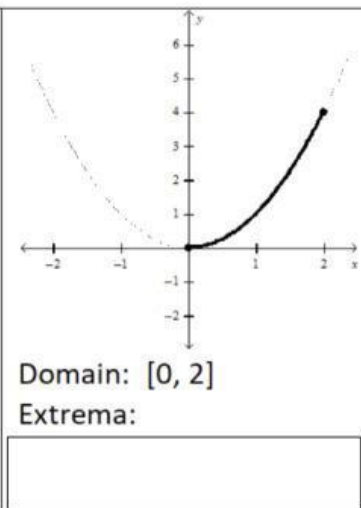
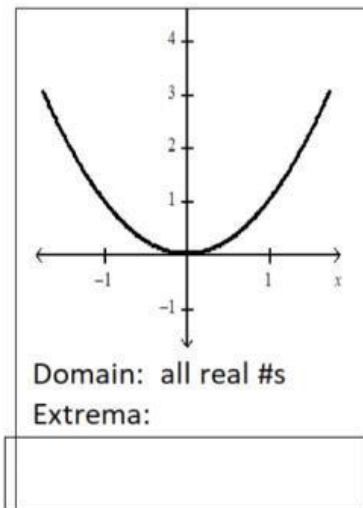


$$y = x^2 - 9 \text{ on } (-3, 3)$$
