Major Festivals in Thailand

1. Songkran Festival (Thai New Year) - April 13-15

- The most famous festival in Thailand, marking the Thai New Year.
- Celebrated with nationwide water fights, symbolizing cleansing and

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- Traditional activities include visiting temples,, and family gatherings.
- Chiang Mai and Bangkok are popular destinations for Songkran celebrations.

2. Loy Krathong - November (Exact Date Varies)

- Known as the "Festival of Lights," it falls on the full moon of the 12thmonth.

- People float small decorated rafts (krathongs) on rivers to pay respect to the Water Goddess.
- In Chiang Mai, the Yi Peng Lantern Festival happens at the same time, where thousands of lanterns are released into the sky.

3. Yi Peng Lantern Festival - November (Same Time as Loy Krathong)

- Celebrated mainly in Northern Thailand, especially in Chiang Mai.
- Thousands of(khom loi) are released into the sky, creating a magical scene.

4. Vegetarian Festival (Nine Emperor Gods Festival) - September/October

- A Taoist festival widely celebrated in Phuket, Bangkok, and other cities with Chinese communities.
- Participants follow a strict vegetarian diet for
- Features extreme rituals such as firewalking and body piercing.

5. Makha Bucha Day - February/March

- A Buddhist holiday commemorating the gathering of 1,250 disciples of Buddha.
- Monks lead candlelit processions at temples across Thailand.

6. Visakha Bucha Day - May

- Celebrates the birth,, and passing of Buddha.

- Devout Buddhists visit temples to make merit and listen to sermons.

7. Royal Ploughing Ceremony - May

- A Brahmin and Buddhistin Bangkok, marking the beginning of the rice-growing season.

- Held at Sanam Luang near the Grand Palace, with participation from members of the Thai royal family.

8. King's and Queen's Birthdays (Father's & Mother's Day)

- **King's Birthday (Father's Day) - December 5** (Birthday of King Rama IX, also National Day)

- **Queen's Birthday (Mother's Day) - August 12** (Birthday of Queen Sirikit)

- Celebrated with candlelight ceremonies, parades, and fireworks.

Other Regional & Cultural Festivals

- **Phi Ta Khon (Ghost Festival) - June/July:** A lively masked festival in Loei Province.

- **Rocket Festival (Bun Bang Fai) - May/June:** A Northeastern festival where homemadeare launched to ask for rain.

- **Buffalo Racing Festival - October:** A unique festival in Chonburi featuring buffalo races.

- **Chinese New Year - January/February:** Celebrated in Chinatown areas across Thailand, especially in Bangkok and Phuket.
