

We use **have + someone + infinitive (without to)** when we ask or tell somebody to do something for us. We normally use this structure when we have some kind of power over the person. Because she or he is our employee, or child, etc. It is quite formal.

We always say who did the action with this structure.

I **had my sister take** me to the airport = My sister took me to the airport because I asked her to do it.

Mary **will have her husband trim** the bushes. = Mary's husband will trim the bushes because she'll ask him to do it.
