


**Phrasal verbs**

**take sth/sb on** = to accept a particular job or responsibility

- *I can't take on any extra work.*

**take sb out** = to go somewhere and do something with someone, usually something you plan and pay for:

- *Dad's taking the whole family out to the cinema.*
- *Our boss took us out for a meal.*

**take off** = (of an aircraft, etc.) to leave the ground and begin to fly:

- *The plane took off an hour late.*

**take up** = to learn or start to do sth, especially for pleasure:

- *They've taken up golf.*
- *She has taken up (= started to learn to play) the oboe.*

**take after** = to look or behave like an older member of your family, especially your mother or father:

- *Your daughter doesn't take after you at all.*
