◆ Past Modals: Could Have / Should Have / Would Have

Past modals are used to talk about possibilities, regrets, or hypothetical situations in the past. They follow this structure:

☑ **Subject + modal verb + have + past participle**

1- Could Have (+ Past Participle) → Possibility or Ability in the Past

- We use "**could have**" to talk about something that was possible in the past but didn't happen.
 - ◆ *Example:* "I **could have studied** more for the exam, but I didn't." (It was possible, but I didn't do it.)

2- Should Have (+ Past Participle) → Regret or Advice About the Past

- We use "**should have**" to talk about something that was a good idea in the past, but we didn't do it.
 - ◆ *Example:* "You **should have brought** an umbrella. It's raining!" (You didn't bring it, but it was a mistake.)

3- Would Have (+ Past Participle) → Hypothetical Situations in the Past

- We use "**would have**" for imaginary situations that **did not happen**.
 - ◆ *Example:* "I **would have helped** you, but I was too busy." (I wanted to help, but I couldn't.)
