To make people understand something.

The teacher couldn't **get** her ideas **across** to the students.**GET AHEAD**

To be successful in the work.

I will **get ahead** at work with this project.**GET ALONG**

have a friendly relationship.

I **get along** with my classmates.**GET AROUND**

To travel to different places

She doesn't have a car, but she **gets around** by bike**GET AT**

To criticize someone repeatedly

She's always **getting at** him about his messy room.**GET AWAY**

To leave or to escape from a person or a place

She usually **gets away** from the crowds.**GET BY**

Manage to survive despite difficulties/ manage with limited knowledge or skill

Even though she doesn't earn much, she manages to **get by**.**GET DOWN (TO)**

descend, /get serious about topic, /to cause someone to be depressed

this hot weather is **getting me down**.**GET ON**

Enter a bus, plane, train.../Start doing or continue doing an activity.

I **got on** the bus at Main Street/He's **getting on** very well at school**GET THROUGH****to be connected by phone**She **got through** to wrong department.**GET IN**

Go inside a car, a home, or a room. Arrive at a place.

I **got in** the taxi and we drove to the airport**GET OFF**

Leave a bus, train, plane, or a place.

I **got off** the train at the next station**GET OUT**

To become known / To leave a car, taxi, room, home, etc...

The secret **got out** before we could stop it/ I'll **get out** when the car stops**GET OVER**

recover from an illness/ overcome a problem

She's only just **getting over** the death of her husband**GET UP**

Get out of bed/ rise to your feet

I always **get up** early**GET BACK**

Return from a trip
