"Of course there is! Just not the kind you were expecting." Grandpa winked, inserting the key into the lock.

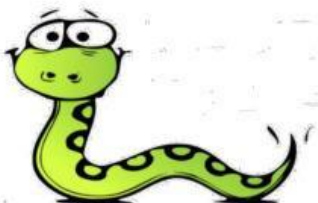
The chest opened with a creak. Inside was not gold or jewels, but a collection of old photographs, letters, and a leatherbound journal.
