

Adjectives Ending in -ed and -ing



ESL Lesson for Adults

Adjectives **ending in -ed** express what people are feeling while adjectives **ending in -ing** describe the characteristics of people, things and places.

Look at the examples to understand the difference:

- I am interested**ed** in this book.
- This book is very interest**ing**.
