

Common Adverbs with Two Forms and Different Meanings

Below are common adverbs that have two forms – one with the suffix -ly and one without. These forms often have distinct meanings, and cannot be used interchangeably.

1. Hard / Hardly

- **Hard** = with effort, intensely

*She trains **hard** for every competition.*

- **Hardly** = barely, almost not

*He could **hardly** believe his eyes.*

2. Late / Lately

- **Late** = not on time

*The bus was **late** again.*

- **Lately** = recently

*I haven't seen him **lately**.*

3. Near / Nearly

- **Near** = close in distance or time

*The school is **near** my house.*

- **Nearly** = almost

*She **nearly** missed the train.*

4. High / Highly

- **High** = at a great height

*The balloon rose **high** into the sky.*

- **Highly** = very, to a great degree

*It's a **highly** recommended film.*

5. Deep / Deeply

- **Deep** = far down or inward (literal)

*They dug **deep** into the ground.*

- **Deeply** = intensely or profoundly (emotional/abstract)

*She was **deeply** touched by the gesture.*

6. Wide / Widely

- **Wide** = to a great width

*He opened the door **wide**.*

- **Widely** = extensively, broadly

*The theory is **widely** accepted.*

7. Right / Rightly

- **Right** = exactly, correctly, or immediately

*He guessed **right**. / They met **right** after the lesson.*

- **Rightly** = justifiably or correctly in opinion

*She was **rightly** praised for her courage.*

8. Short / Shortly

- **Short** = abruptly, suddenly

*He stopped **short** and stared.*

- **Shortly** = soon, in a little while

*The manager will arrive **shortly**.*

9. Fair / Fairly

- **Fair** = honestly or justly (rare/poetic)

*He played **fair**.*

- **Fairly** = moderately or to some degree

*The test was **fairly** difficult.*

10. Most / Mostly

- **Most** = to a greater degree or more times than anything else

*What she likes **most** is ice cream.*

- **Mostly** = mainly or generally

*The crowd was **mostly** friendly.*
