Papyrus

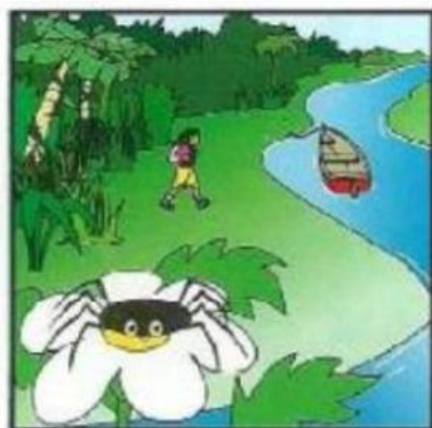

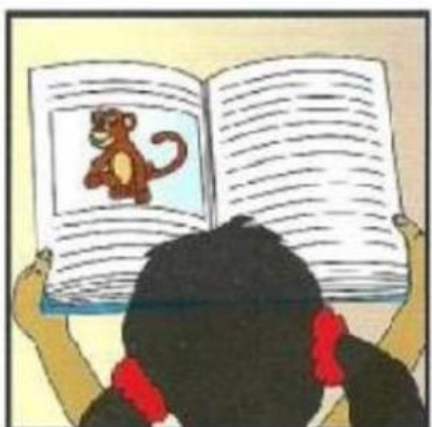
