

Live Worksheet: “Introduction to Poetry” by Billy Collins

Instructions:

1. Read the poem carefully.
 2. Answer the multiple-choice questions connected to each stanza.
 3. Complete the reflection at the end in full paragraphs.
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1. First Stanza

*I ask them to take a poem
and hold it up to the light
like a color slide*

Q1. What is the speaker suggesting students should do with a poem?

- a) Memorize it word for word
 - b) Examine it carefully and attentively, like a slide under light
 - c) Translate it into another language
 - d) Read it quickly and move on
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2. Second Stanza

or press an ear against its hive.

Q2. What feeling or action is this metaphor trying to convey?

- a) Listening closely to find subtle meanings and “buzzes” inside the poem
 - b) Being afraid of bees and noise
 - c) Destroying the poem’s structure
 - d) Ignoring outside distractions while reading
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3. Third and Fourth Stanza

*I say drop a mouse into a poem
and watch him probe his way out,*

Q3. Why does the poet describe putting a mouse into a poem?

- a) To test if the poem is safe

- b) To show that poems should be solved like puzzles, by exploration
 - c) To scare the reader
 - d) To teach biology using poetry
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4. Fifth Stanza

*or walk inside the poem's room
and feel the walls for a light switch.*

Q4. This image most strongly suggests:

- a) Turning off the poem
 - b) Looking for the deeper meaning slowly, patiently
 - c) Finding a way to escape the poem
 - d) Repairing the room's electricity
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5. Sixth Stanza

*I want them to waterski
across the surface of a poem
waving at the author's name on the shore.*

Q5. The speaker is encouraging students to:

- a) Have fun and enjoy the poem, not always dive too deep
 - b) Swim underwater to understand it
 - c) Leave the poem and go to the shore
 - d) Look for the author's biography before reading
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6. Seventh & Eighth Stanza

*But all they want to do
is tie the poem to a chair with rope
and torture a confession out of it.
They begin beating it with a hose
to find out what it really means.*

Q6. What criticism is the speaker making here?
