EXPLANATION

What is an Imperative?

An imperative is a sentence that gives a command, instruction, advice, or request. It usually starts with a verb and does not have a subject because the subject is understood to be "you".

SPELLING RULES

- Imperatives use the base form of the verb.
Clean your boots.
- For negative imperatives, use:
Don't + base verb
No subject ("You") is needed.



1. Raise your hand.

GRAMMAR CHART

Form	Example
Base verb	<i>Stand up!</i>
Negative form	<i>Don't talk!</i>
Polite form	<i>Please close the door.</i>

USES OF IMPERATIVES

| Orders/Commands | • March! |
| Instructions | • Stop! |
| Warnings | • Don't run! |
| Requests (polite) | • Please pass the flag. |

Military Examples:
