Robbers waylay victim's car with tale of leaking gas tank

Cathy Shannon didn't know what to make of the two men who pulled alongside her on Interstate 95 Sunday. They kept yelling that her gas tank was leaking.

Finally, she pulled off the road to check it out. The two men also pulled over - and robbed Shannon's 90-year-old mother, a passenger in the car.

"It's another variation of an old trick," said Metro-Dade robbery detective Tommy Robson. "The robbers spotted the rental car, faked them out and waited until they pulled over."

Shannon, 68, and her mother, Anna Shulem, who is visiting from New York, were not hurt. The robbers got away with Shulem's purse, jewelry and about \$300.

The women were driving north on I-95 at 8:30 p.m. in a 1989 Ford Tempo. The car had a Hertz rental sticker on the rear bumper.

"That's what most of these guys look for," Robson said. "They bet that it's going to be a tourist driving it and a lot of times they're right."

The robbers, in a white Nissan, pulled up next to Shannon near the exit for Northwest 62nd Street. The passenger leaned out and yelled that the gas tank was leaking.

Shannon was suspicious, so she kept going. The two men persisted in their pursuit. Shannon was planning to get off the highway at Northwest 103rd Street. When she did, she decided to stop and check the tank.

She left Shulem sitting in the passenger seat. As she was inspecting the rear of the Ford, the robbers pulled up.

One of them hopped out, ran to the car, and grabbed Shulem's purse. The elderly woman tried to hold on, but couldn't. The purse was ripped from her hands.

The thieves would have gotten away if it had not been for Jan Shakespeare, 39. She and a friend were driving by and saw the robbery.

They chased the robbers, but couldn't catch them.

They did, however, get a tag number.

Robson and detective Chirs Green checked the tag and got the home address of the driver. They went to the house at 1130 NW 91st St. and waited.

At 11:30 p.m., Anthony Archer, 22, pulled up in the Nissan.

Robson charged him with strong-arm robbery, and Archer later confessed, police said.

None of Shulem's belongings was recovered.
