Different signs, different meanings

When Annie moved to South Korea for work, she was excited to experience a new culture. But within her first week, she faced several cultural misunderstandings. One day, during a team meeting, she gave a “thumbs up” to a colleague, meaning “great job!” However, her coworker looked embarrassed and didn’t respond. Later, another colleague explained that the gesture might not mean the same thing in every country.

Another time, she entered a restaurant and saw a sign that said “No Sound.” She thought it could mean no music or loud talking, but then realized it referred to keeping your phone on silent. These small misunderstandings taught Annie the importance of observing and asking questions.

In many cultures, body language is just as important as words. For example, in some countries, making direct eye contact must be a sign of honesty and confidence. In others, it might be considered rude or aggressive. A simple nod or smile can have different meanings, depending on the context.

Learning to adapt to these differences takes time. But Annie says that now she pays more attention, listens more carefully, and tries not to assume. "Misunderstandings will happen," she says. "But when you show respect and make an effort, people will appreciate it."
