

MY FRIEND'S DAY



Read and revise Present Simple.



When the sentence is affirmative and it starts with “**she**” or “**he**”, add **-s** at the end of the verb:

He comes home at one o'clock.



When the sentence is negative and it starts with “**she**” or “**he**”, use the auxiliary word “**doesn't**”:

She doesn't eat breakfast at night.



When the sentence is a question, use the auxiliary word “**does**” for “**she**” or “**he**”:

Does he watch TV?

Yes, he does.

No, he doesn't.



SPELLING RULES: If the verb ends in “o”, “sh” or “ch”, add **-es** at the end of the verb in affirmative sentences with “**she**” or “**he**”.

LOOK!

Go to school >> Goes to school



Brush my teeth >> Brushes her teeth

Watch TV >> Watches TV

Listen and repeat.
