



Reflect on language
For - Since

We often use *for* and *since* when talking about time, but there are differences. Let's see them:

Affirmative			
She	has	worked	in the Andes.
I	have	seen	a wolf.
You	have	driven	a car.
I	have	painted	a boat.

◆ **For**

We use *for* when we talk about a period of time. See the examples:
I have studied *for* hours.
She has traveled *for* two days.

◆ **Since**

We use *since* when we talk about a precise moment or time. See the examples:
I have studied *since* yesterday.
She has traveled *since* last Sunday.
