PASSAGE VIII

My Kind of Day : by Mohammed Amin

Somalia, Ethiopia, Namibia, Kenya, Britain - my day could start in any of these countries. And in the past year it has. As a television camera and photo-journalist - I'm the Africa Bureau Chief for Reuters Television and I also run my own company, Camerapix - I'm ready to fly out at a moment's notice. I keep my suitcase permanently packed.

- 5 I have an office in London, but I am based in Nairobi, Kenya, where I was born, though I tend to be away from home for nine months of the year. I co-ordinate Reuter's television news coverage of the whole of Africa but I prefer to 'shoot' rather than administrate - if a major story breaks, I try to be there.

- 10 Some might think I keep the best jobs for myself, though dodging bullets and angry mobs is not everybody's idea of 'best'. A rocket took off my left forearm and I got seven bullets in the right arm and shrapnel in my shoulder when a bomb blew up in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, while I was filming there in 1991. Now I have a computerised artificial arm which is activated by my bicep and tricep muscles. Its components come from space research at NASA. I can open and close the hand and rotate the wrist but I only use it for
15 camera work. I have always driven my car with one hand!

- When I'm on location, whether it's for television news or taking stills for one of the travel books I publish, the day inevitably follows the story. But the planning is vital. Ninety-five per cent of the work is logistics and your contacts are very important. Without them you can't do this job. Having a wide circle of acquaintances opens every door. I am very lucky
20 because I am able to get on the phone personally to at least a dozen Prime Ministers all of whom I know well. And speaking fourteen languages helps.

- I do have a daily routine when I'm home. I live with my 22-year-old son, Salim (he's just joined my company as a trainee) on the outskirts of Nairobi, though I don't have much of a family life. I start my day at around two in the morning (I go to bed at 9 p.m.), working in
25 my pyjamas from an office and editing studio behind the house. I drink tea - about twelve cups - until it's time to drive into the Reuters office at the Press Centre at 7 a.m. The first thing to do here is sort out the overnight messages - which go into a computer system straight from London - and read the papers and bureau reports. Then I begin to arrange the day's coverage. There are always crews to get in and out of countries, rushes to view,
30 satellite links to be booked. Lunch is a waste of time and, anyway, I work better without food.

- I get home at about 7 p.m. and the cook will prepare an Indian, Asian or European meal because I like trying different types of food. Then I listen to the BBC World Service news and go to bed - knackered! It's the same routine at the weekend too, and I can never have
35 a vacation for pleasure. Taking pictures in places such as the Maldives and the Seychelles seems holiday enough.

Hobbies? I collect stamps, especially African and Asian first-day covers. One day, when I am too old to work, maybe I'll sit down and put them in an album. Or maybe I won't.
