Did Tomás take them by mistake?

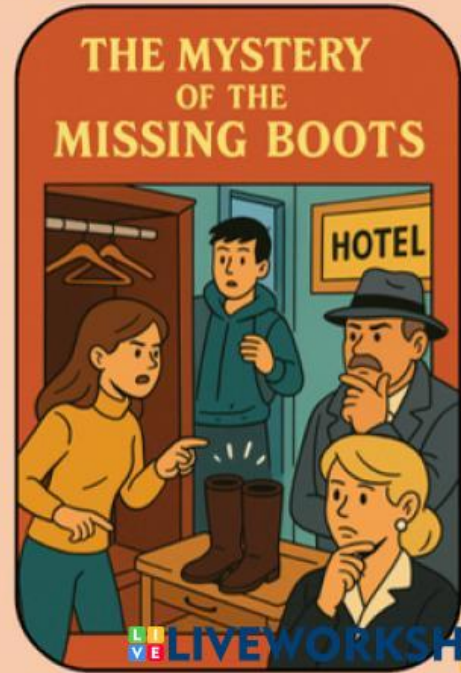

 Tourism Trends in Chile – 2023 Report

In 2023, more than **4.5 million tourists visited Chile**. Many visitors **came** from Argentina, Brazil, the United States, and Europe. Most of them **arrived** by plane, while some **entered** by land through the Andes. Santiago, San Pedro de Atacama, and Patagonia **were** the most popular destinations.

Tourists usually **stayed** for **7 to 10 days** and **spent** an average of **900 U.S. dollars** during their trip. They **booked** hotels, eco-lodges, and guided tours. Many tourists **wanted** to see nature, taste local food, and learn about Chilean culture.

The Ministry of Tourism **collected** feedback through surveys. According to the results, 86% of tourists **felt** satisfied with their trip, but some people **asked** for more cultural activities and better transport between cities.

In response, local companies **created** food festivals, **offered** new cultural tours, and **improved** bus and shuttle services. They also **shared** more information online in Spanish, English, and Portuguese.

Tourism officials **said** these actions **helped** increase the number of visitors and **supported** local businesses and sustainable travel in Chile.
