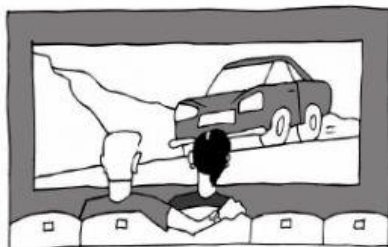

Belle the Dog

On 17th August, San Diego emergency services answered a call from Kevin Weaver's phone and because they could only hear a dog at the end of the line, they hurried to his house. There they found the man lying unconscious¹ on the floor so they quickly took him to the hospital. Belle – Kevin's dog, which was trained to recognise diabetic shocks – called the ambulance with its owner's mobile. The dog used its teeth to press the number nine key, which was programmed by Kevin's daughter as a 911 call to emergency services. When Kevin felt a little bit better, his daughter took Belle to see him in the hospital. The dog ran to its master as soon as it saw him there, and both of them were happy to see each other again. The dog is the first animal that has won the Vita Wireless Award – the award for individuals who used their mobile phones to save lives.

Disappearing Ice Helps Archaeologists

Disappearing glaciers¹ are exciting for archaeologists because interesting things can be discovered once the ice has gone. Probably the best-known example is Ötzi, a prehistoric man who lived at the foot of the Italian Alps 5,300 years ago. In the mountains of Norway, archaeologists made another interesting discovery: a pre-Viking woollen long-sleeved shirt. This piece of clothing, made there around 300 AD, was found on the road where tradesmen transported goods to market. Only a few similar shirts from that time have survived. One puzzle is why anyone would take off a warm long-sleeved shirt in icy weather and leave it on the road. Maybe the owner was suffering from hypothermia, a problem which makes people take off clothing because they wrongly feel hot when it is actually freezing cold.

Penguins in Antarctica

Jeff Wilson, the director of the documentary Frozen Planet, spent three months filming penguins in Antarctica. He noticed that during their one-month breeding season¹, the male birds were building special homes for their eggs – they made holes and filled them with stones to protect their eggs. Males with the most stones in their holes were more attractive to females, so in a colony of half a million penguins, the best stones were highly prized. Several times, Wilson even saw penguins that kept bringing stones to their holes for long hours not knowing that their neighbours were stealing a stone every time they left their holes unprotected. Mr Wilson compared the penguin colony during their breeding season to a field of tents at a music festival, and added, "Male penguins are like male festival-goers who have had too much beer – they're egoistic and aggressive to other males."
