When the month ended, I didn't want to leave. I had made new friends, learned a lot about a different culture, and discovered that summer doesn't always have to be about relaxing – sometimes, doing something meaningful can be even more rewarding.

I'm already thinking about next summer. Maybe I'll volunteer in another country, or maybe I'll return to the same village. What I know for sure is that I want every holiday to be an opportunity to grow, not just a break from school.
