2. Reading: What Did People Do Before Smartphones?

In 2000, I got the RIM 957, my first BlackBerry. It received, in real time, emails sent to my work account. Such receipt would cause the device to flash a light and buzz, pager-style. It buzzed constantly.

Over the years that followed, I kept clicking on my keyboard phones until eventually the iPhone replaced them. I have memories of using a Palm Treo on the train and my BlackBerry at lunch through most of the

2000s. But I can't remember how I'd spent my idle time in the years before. Literally, what did we do? I cannot recall.

Some things are easy to reconstruct. Email came to you at your desk. MapQuest was around, but you had to print out directions before you went anywhere. Photography was less a part of daily life, absent social media on which to post.

Television was another way of killing time. We watched a lot of it — game shows, daytime soaps, sitcoms, the evening news, MTV. Television was just sort of on, sort of all the time.

Before smartphones, people didn't invest their in-between time into forging social bonds or doing self-improvement. They mostly suffered through constant, endless boredom. Now there is too much happening, but before, nothing ever happened.

- Regular verbs → add **-ed** (watch → watched, play → played)
- Irregular verbs → change form (go → went, have → had, be → was/were)
- Negative → **didn't + base verb**
- Question → **Did + subject + base verb?**
