SECOND CONDITIONAL: UNREAL POSSIBILITY, DREAM, MORAL DILEMMA

With the **second conditional** there is **not** a real possibility that this condition will happen. For example, you do **not** have a lottery ticket. Is it possible to win? No, but you can think about winning in the future, like a dream or an unreal possibility.

IF	CONDITION	RESULT
IF	PAST SIMPLE	WOULD + MAIN VERB (INFINITIVE)
If	I won the lottery,	I would buy a castle.
If	I didn't win the lottery,	I wouldn't buy a castle.
If	it snowed next July,	would you be surprised?



1 Sometimes, we use modal verbs like **should**, **could** or **might** instead of **would**. We cannot use them with **would** in the same clause.

If she had time, she would may go to the party. ❌
If she had time, she might go to the party. ✅

2 If I were ...

In the second Conditional, the form "was" is not considered grammatically correct. In written English or in testing situations, you should always use "were." However, in everyday conversation, "was" is often used.

If he were French, he would eat croissants everyday. ✅
I would buy that smartphone if it was cheaper. ❌ (used informally)

3 We also use the 2nd conditional to talk about moral dilemmas. Example: If I were adopted, I would look for my biological parents.

4 We can use the 2nd conditional to give advice. Example: *If I were you, I would apologize to her.*


