Democrats

right-leaning or conservative

- most favor government spending on the military
- tend to believe that taxing businesses and the wealthy gets in the way of economic growth
- many support lower taxes for everyone which allows people and businesses to spend their money as they choose
 - many believe the government should play a smaller role in people's lives
 - they feel hard work and personal responsibility, not government intervention, should lead to economic success
 - in general, less likely to embrace wide-reaching social programs

left-leaning or liberal

- think the federal government should help make sure everyone has the opportunity to succeed
- generally support social programs like health care for everyone
- usually support increased spending on government services like public education
- aren't afraid to raise taxes as long as they think it will benefit society as a whole
- tend to believe that higher taxes on big businesses and wealthy people help keep American society running smoothly
