REMEMBER!!	
Dynamic Passive	Stative Passive
Focuses on the <u>action</u> and the <u>receiver</u> of the action. The past participle acts like an action verb here (built, created, moved). <ul style="list-style-type: none">Example: The book was read by the teacher.	Describes a <u>state or condition</u> without an action. Past participle acts more like an adjective (known, situated, famous). <ul style="list-style-type: none">Example: The book is known for its plot.
