Use **ONE** with a singular countable noun

Use **ONES** with a plural countable noun

1/ my car is the red

a) one

b) ones

2/ My trousers are torn. I need some new

We use **enough** to mean sufficient:

Adjective + enough

We use **too** to mean more than sufficient or more/ less than necessary

Too + adjective

1/ I can't do this test. It's [**too** - **to** - **enough** - **just**] difficult

2/ You need another computer. This one isn't fast[**too** - **to** - **enough** - **just**]

3/ It's [**too** - **to** - **enough** - **just**] dangerous to climb up this tree

4/ the water isn't warm[**too** - **to** - **enough** - **just**]

5/ that light is [**too** - **to** - **enough** - **just**] bright

6/ He isn't old[**too** - **to** - **enough** - **just**] to drive

7/ I'm not tall[**too** - **to** - **enough** - **just**] for the basketball team

8/ This food is [**too** - **to** - **enough** - **just**] salty

9/ Please can you turn up the CD player? It isn't loud[**too** - **to** - **enough** - **just**].

10/ this computer is old and slow. It's not fast[**too** - **to** - **enough** - **just**]
