

Bram Stoker

Bram Stoker (1847–1912) was an Irish writer, best known for his popular Gothic novel *Dracula* (1897). Born in Dublin, he overcame childhood illness and studied mathematics at Trinity College before working at Dublin Castle as a civil servant. He also became a respected theater critic for the *Dublin Evening Mail*.

Stoker's career took a major turn when he befriended actor Sir Henry Irving and became his manager at the Lyceum Theatre in London, where he worked for nearly 30 years. Alongside his theater work, he continued writing novels and stories, with *Dracula* eventually becoming world-famous and inspiring countless adaptations.

Although the novel was only modestly popular during his lifetime, *Dracula* gained enormous popularity after his death, especially through films like the 1931 version starring Bela Lugosi. Stoker died in London in 1912, leaving behind a legacy that shaped modern vampire fiction and popular culture.
