



Speed Breakers

In 1898, Count Gaston de Chasseloup-Laubat became the first person to hold the land speed record. He drove his electric car in a competition run by a French magazine. The competition organizers measured his time and found that he reached a speed of about 63 kilometers per hour! But 100 years later, things looked a little different. In 1997, Andy Green, a fighter pilot, set a new land speed record in the Thrust SSC (Super Sonic Car), a car that looked more like a jet plane. Andy Green drove the Thrust SSC at an astonishing 1,227.985 kilometers per hour.

However, Andy Green plans on breaking the record again with a new car called the Bloodhound SSC. It is hoped that the Bloodhound will travel about 1,600 kilometers per hour!
