

## Words for talking about yourself

	<b>address</b>	NOUN Your <b>address</b> is the number of the building, the name of the street, and the town or city where you live or work.
	<b>age</b>	NOUN Your <b>age</b> is the number of years that you have lived.
	<b>be ... years old</b>	PHRASE If someone is <b>twelve years old</b> , they have lived for twelve years.
	<b>born</b>	VERB When a baby is <b>born</b> , it comes out of its mother's body and begins life.
	<b>city</b>	NOUN A <b>city</b> is a large town.
	<b>college</b>	NOUN <b>College</b> is a place where students study after they leave school.
	<b>country</b>	NOUN The <b>country</b> is land that is away from cities and towns.
	<b>family</b>	NOUN A <b>family</b> is a group of people who are related to each other, usually parents and their children.
	<b>family name</b>	NOUN Your <b>family name</b> is the part of your name that all the people in your family have.
	<b>first name</b>	NOUN Your <b>first name</b> is the name that comes before your family name.
	<b>job</b>	NOUN A <b>job</b> is the work that someone does to earn money.
	<b>live</b>	VERB If you <b>live</b> somewhere, you have your home in that place.
	<b>name</b>	NOUN A person's <b>name</b> is the word or words that you use to talk to them, or to talk about them.
	<b>nationality</b>	NOUN If you have the <b>nationality</b> of a particular country, you are a legal citizen of that country.
	<b>school</b>	NOUN A <b>school</b> is a place where people go to learn.
	<b>street</b>	NOUN A <b>street</b> is a road in a city or a town.
	<b>student</b>	NOUN A <b>student</b> is a person who is studying at a school, college, or university.
	<b>study</b>	1 VERB If you <b>study</b> , you spend time learning about a particular subject. 2 NOUN <b>Study</b> is the activity of studying.
	<b>university</b>	NOUN A <b>university</b> is a place where you can study after school.
	<b>work</b>	VERB People who <b>work</b> have a job and earn money for it.

	<b>boy</b>	NOUN A <b>boy</b> is a male child.
	<b>brother</b>	NOUN A <b>brother</b> is a boy or a man who has the same parents as you.
	<b>child</b>	NOUN A <b>child</b> is a young boy or girl.
	<b>children</b>	NOUN <b>Children</b> is the plural of child.
	<b>dad</b>	NOUN Your <b>dad</b> is your father.
	<b>daughter</b>	NOUN Someone's <b>daughter</b> is their female child.
	<b>family</b>	NOUN A <b>family</b> is a group of people who are related to each other, usually parents and their children.

	<b>address</b>	NOUN Your <b>address</b> is the number of the building, the name of the street, and the town or city where you live or work.
	<b>bath</b>	NOUN A <b>bath</b> is a container that you fill with water and sit in to wash your body.
	<b>bathroom</b>	NOUN A <b>bathroom</b> is a room that contains a bath or a shower and often a toilet.
	<b>bed</b>	NOUN A <b>bed</b> is a piece of furniture that you lie on when you sleep.
	<b>bedroom</b>	NOUN A <b>bedroom</b> is a room where people sleep.
	<b>chair</b>	NOUN A <b>chair</b> is a piece of furniture for one person to sit on, with a back and four legs.
	<b>dining room</b>	NOUN A <b>dining room</b> is a room where people eat their meals.
	<b>door</b>	NOUN A <b>door</b> is a piece of wood, glass, or metal that fills an entrance.
	<b>flat</b>	NOUN A <b>flat</b> is a set of rooms for living in, usually on one floor.
	<b>garden</b>	NOUN A <b>garden</b> is an area by your house where you grow flowers and vegetables.
	<b>home</b>	NOUN Someone's <b>home</b> is the place where they live.
	<b>house</b>	NOUN A <b>house</b> is a building where people live.
	<b>key</b>	NOUN A <b>key</b> is a shaped piece of metal that opens or closes a lock.
	<b>kitchen</b>	NOUN A <b>kitchen</b> is a room that is used for cooking.
	<b>live</b>	VERB If you <b>live</b> somewhere, you have your home in that place.
	<b>living room</b>	NOUN The <b>living room</b> in a house is the room where people sit together and talk or watch television.
	<b>shower</b>	NOUN A <b>shower</b> is a thing that you stand under, that covers you with water so you can wash yourself.
	<b>table</b>	NOUN A <b>table</b> is a piece of furniture with a flat top that you put things on or sit at.
	<b>toilet</b>	NOUN A <b>toilet</b> is a large bowl with a seat that you use when you want to get rid of waste from your body.
	<b>wall</b>	NOUN A <b>wall</b> is one of the sides of a building or a room.
	<b>window</b>	NOUN A <b>window</b> is a space in the wall of a building or in the side of a vehicle that has glass in it.






