A. Read the text and answer the questions

The Baseball Cap

When baseball started becoming popular in America in the 1840s and '50s, teams wore a variety of different hats to keep the sun out of their eyes. The first team to wear something like modern caps was the Brooklyn Excelsiors in 1860. People called these caps the "Brooklyn Style" and they soon became very popular.

The peak, or the front part of the Brooklyn cap, was softer and shorter than that of the caps we have today. Also, the caps were wool or cotton, but most of today's caps are polyester. Like today, the main part of the cap had six smaller parts with a button on the top, and caps were the same colors as the team's uniforms. In the early 1900s, team logos started appearing on the front of the cap, something that continues today. The modern cap first appeared in the 1940s, when hat makers used rubber in the peak to make it harder and longer. This worked even better to keep the sun out of players' eyes.

Today, baseball players are not the only athletes who wear baseball caps. Others wear them too, including tennis players and golfers. In fact, many people wear them when they play an outdoor sport and don't want the sun in their eyes. Finally, baseball caps are useful for lots of people other than athletes: police officers and construction workers wear caps that are like baseball caps for the same reason. They are also very fashionable for young people.
