We use **so / such** _____ **that** to describe a situation and its effect.

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Rule 1: so + _____ / adverb that

‘She cooked the chicken at **such a high temperature** that she almost burnt it.’

‘It was **such a hot dish** that I had to wait a few minutes before digging in.’

Rule 4: such + adjective + _____ noun that...

‘This is **such good news** that I want to tell everybody.’

‘They are **such tasty muffins** that I want to share them with everyone.’

→ ‘These are such _____ that _____.’

Special rule: *a lot of* is used with *such*
