

# OPEN CLOZE!



Read the text and complete the open cloze exercise by writing ONE word in each blank.



## Responsible Tourism in our local areas:

## FRIENDLY REMINDER!

This is a list of typical words often tested in open cloze activities:

**Articles:** *a, an, the*

**Prepositions:** *in, on, at, to, for, of, about, from, with*

**Pronouns:** *it, they, them, which, who, that*

**Linkers:** *and, but, because, although, however*

**Auxiliaries / modals:** *do, does, did, have, has, will, can, would*

**Remind yourself:** many answers are small, simple words, not difficult vocabulary.



In an open cloze task, you read a short text with gaps and you must complete each gap with one word. To do this well, don't rush to write the answers. First, read the whole text quickly to understand the main idea: Who is speaking? Where are they? What is happening? This global understanding will help you choose the correct words later.

Next, focus on the grammar around each gap. Look at the word before and after. Ask yourself: Do I need a preposition (in, on, at)? An article (a, an, the)? An auxiliary or modal (have, do, can, will)? A pronoun (it, they, who)? Or maybe the second part of a phrasal verb (turn off, use up)?

Then, think about meaning. Read the sentence and ask: What word makes sense here? Use your knowledge of collocations such as responsible for or take care of.

Remember: only one word is allowed. If you write two, the answer is wrong, even if the meaning is correct. Finally, read the whole text again and check grammar, meaning, and spelling carefully before you finish.
