



Although April Fools' Day has been celebrated for several centuries by different cultures, its exact origins remain a mystery. One theory suggests that the day comes from the change in the calendar in Europe from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar. This moved the New Year from April 1 to January 1. celebrated the New Year on April 1, other people played practical jokes on them.

Historians have linked April Fools' Day to festivals such as Hilaria, which was celebrated in ancient Rome at the end of March and involved people dressing up in disguises. A hundred and three huge shipping containers filled with plastic and electronic garbage have been sitting at a port near Manila, the Philippines's capital city. The president of the Philippines, Rodrigo Duterte, gave a "warning" to Canada that it needs to take back the garbage. "Prepare a grand reception," he said, "Your garbage is coming home."

The shipping containers were shipped from Canada in 2012 and 2013. The containers are labelled "plastic." The contents were sent to the Philippines to be recycled.

However, customs inspectors say the containers are actually full of about 2,500 tons of household garbage, plastics and electronics. Only about a third of what is in the containers can be recycled, according to the Globe and Mail.

Environmentalists in the Philippines and in Canada say that Canada has an obligation to take the garbage back. They say the waste is "illegal." They point to the Basel Convention, which is an agreement about how hazardous waste may be transported, especially from western countries to developing countries.

Canada is taking steps to reclaim the garbage. However, there is an issue about who will pay for its transportation because the government cannot try to get the money from the company that sent it until all of the garbage is back in Canada again.
