MICKEY MOUSE

Mickey Mouse is an American cartoon character created in 1928 at Walt Disney Animation Studios by Walt Disney and Ub Iwerks. He is the Walt Disney Company's mascot. Mickey is a mouse who wears red shorts, large yellow shoes, and white gloves. He is known for his small size and falsetto voice, the latter of which was originally provided by Walt Disney. Mickey is known all around the world as a very famous cartoon character.



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MINNIE MOUSE

Minnie Mouse is an American cartoon character created by Walt Disney. She is Mickey Mouse's girlfriend. Her birthday is on 18th November 1928. She only first appeared in 1928, in "Plane Crazy". She is also known as Princess Minnie and Maestro Minnie. Minnie's favorite foods are cheese, chocolate and cake. She loves listening to jazz music, cooking, baking, shopping and makeup.



Donald Duck

Donald Duck is a cartoon character created by Walt Disney. He is a white duck with an yellowish-orange bill and legs. He usually wears a sailor cap, a blue sailor shirt and a black or red bow tie. He first appeared on-screen in "The Wise Little Hen" on 9 June 1934. Donald is Scrooge McDuck's nephew. His girlfriend is Daisy Duck and his nephews are Huey, Dewey and Louie. His best friends are Mickey Mouse and Goofy. Donald sometimes gets angry and has a voice that is hard to understand. Donald appeared in animated shorts, comic books, and newspaper comic strips.




Daisy Duck

Daisy Duck is an American cartoon character created by the Walt Disney Company. As the girlfriend of Donald Duck, she is a white duck that has large eyelashes and ruffled tail feathers suggesting a skirt. She is often seen wearing a hair bow, blouse, and heeled shoes. Daisy was introduced in the short film Mr. Duck Steps Out (1940) and was incorporated into Donald's comic stories several months later.




Goofy

Goofy is a cartoon character created by Disney. He is a tall, dog-like character who usually wears a turtleneck, vest, pants, shoes, white gloves, and a tall hat. Goofy is friends with Mickey Mouse and Donald Duck, and Max Goof's dad. He is often seen as clumsy and not very smart, but sometimes he can be clever in his own way.

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Pronunciation Tips - Words Ending in -EY

In English, the pronunciation of words ending with letter -EY may be different. The -EY is usually pronounced as /i:/, as in my name, but in some words, the -EY is pronounced as /eɪ/. Let's have a look, ha-hee!
