### Where's my stuff?

When travelling, we tend to take some of our most valued possessions. From practical gadgets like smartphones and laptops, to more personal items, such as jewellery and favourite clothes. But recently, travellers are having to deal with luggage that disappears during flights. Why is this happening, and what can we do about it?

The good news is that most bags are eventually returned to their owners. I'm sure they are delighted to hear their luggage is being returned but I can imagine not having what you expected for your holiday, or business meeting. However, that still means a small proportion does disappear forever though and surprisingly some owners, it seems, don't even put their name on their bags, which can't help. Although I've never experienced it, I can well imagine the stress associated with worrying whether you'll be reunited with your possessions. The main cause of missing luggage is how we travel. As we cross the globe making transfers and catching connecting flights, our luggage just can't keep up. At some airports, a shortage of baggage handlers means that there are too few people loading and unloading planes. Despite air travel being a hi-tech industry, most planes are loaded by hand. The average loader has to lift 150 bags in 40 minutes. In a daily eight-hour shift, loading six planes, they lift an exhausting 20,000 kilograms. Any break taken in unloading means that travellers may have moved on in their journey before their bags arrive in an air terminal.

Another key area is check-in. Studies have shown that 16% of lost luggage becomes lost because it is incorrectly tagged by airline staff. While you are comfortably setting out for one destination, your bags are heading elsewhere. Experts believe that this issue is caused by the pressure to move greater volumes of passengers at greater speeds. However, they point out, taking a few seconds to check that printed labels match tickets could save passengers days of inconvenience, and the industry millions in penalties.

Many passengers are already taking their own precautions. Tracker tags provide real-time information on the specific location of an item. These affordable gadgets are now commonly used by seasoned travellers. But while placing a tag in your luggage should mean you know where it is, the system is not always accurate. The tags use wireless technology to send signals between devices to register their position. However, if there are too few devices in range, or the mode of transport is moving too quickly, the signals may not be picked up. The same issue can occur in more remote areas where signals are weak.

But some technological solutions are working hard to reunite lost luggage to its rightful owners. The automated lost and found AI system requires users to upload a photo of their missing personal items. It then sorts through images of personal possessions found in airports to find a match. Currently, the software has a successful match rate of 89.6%. The more data it receives, the better it gets at doing its job, which means lost items are returned faster. Perhaps soon we'll be able to travel without wondering where and when our luggage will arrive.
