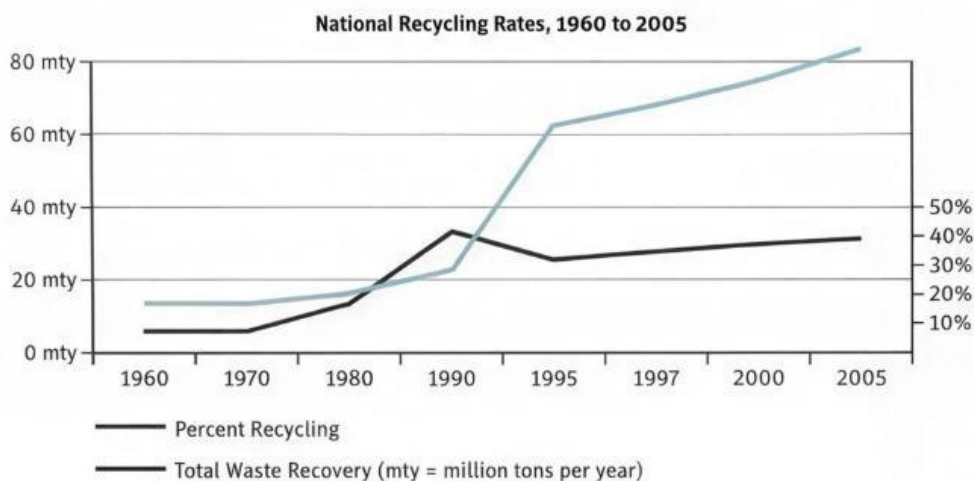

Note the way we use prepositions with numbers and dates:

35%	10%
1995	1997

In 1997 the number fell **to** 10%; **In** 1997 the number fell **by** 25%; **In** 1997 the number fell **from** 35%. NOT *in*-35%; The number dropped **to** 10% **between** 1995 and 1997. NOT *reduced-to*; **By** 1997 the number had fallen **to** 10%. See also units 7 and 13.

The graph shows the amount of garbage collected and recycled annually in America ¹..... between..... 1960 and 2005. From 1960 to 1970 the amount of waste being recycled remained fairly ²..... at just over 6%. However, this figure ³..... significantly from 1970 to 1990 when it ⁴..... at approximately 32% of the total waste collected. On the other hand, the amount of waste being produced increased ⁵..... at around the same time, growing ⁶..... approximately 10 million tonnes per year ⁷..... 55 million tonnes within five years. Following this sharp ⁸..... the amount of waste collected has risen ⁹....., while the percentage of waste being recycled actually ¹⁰..... from 32% to 26% ¹¹..... 1995. Slump: Sharp, significant drop, often suddenly (stronger than "declined"). Use for dramatic falls in sales, prices, or figures.

Slipp: Gradual, minor decrease (gentler than "dropped"). Perfect for small, steady declines over time.

Plung: Sudden, steep drop (most dramatic downward verb). Shows rapid, severe decline to a low point.

Soare: Rapid, strong upward movement (faster than "rose"). For explosive growth or sudden peaks.

Level off: Become flat/horizontal after rising or falling. Movement stops; stays steady at a new level
