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Scoring Guide

Teacher Prompt: Today you'll read a passage and identify the author's purpose. For each question, look for specific examples in the text that show why the author wrote this passage. Remember to look for different types of evidence like word choice, facts, emotional appeals, or how the text is organized.

Item	Model Student Response	Points
#1	The primary purpose is to persuade. Evidence: 1) Word choice: "incredible opportunity" and "don't miss out" show persuasive language. 2) Emotional appeal: "Imagine yourself exploring ancient ruins while your friends sit in regular classrooms" appeals to the reader's emotions and desire to be special.	
#2	The phrase "once-in-a-lifetime opportunity" is persuasive language that creates urgency and makes the reader feel they should act quickly or miss out on something special. This supports the author's purpose to persuade students to join the summer program.	
#3	The organizational structure supports persuasion by starting with an attention-grabbing question, then presenting benefits, then ending with a call to action ("Sign up today!"). This structure is designed to first hook the reader's interest, build excitement, and then push them to take action.	
#4	Facts: 1) "Students learn twice as much during immersive experiences" 2) "Over 500 students have participated in past years" These facts support persuasion by making the program seem credible and successful, encouraging readers to trust the program and want to join it.	
#5	1) "Imagine yourself exploring ancient ruins while your friends sit in regular classrooms" appeals to desire to be special/different. 2) "Create memories that will last a lifetime" appeals to the desire for meaningful experiences. Both support persuasion by making readers feel emotionally drawn to the program.

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Strategies and Resources for Assessment

Suggested Materials for Support

Highlighters (multiple colors):

Provide highlighters to help the student mark different types of evidence in the text (e.g., yellow for facts/statistics, blue for emotional appeals, green for persuasive language). This visual support can help students with auditory processing disorder identify and categorize textual evidence more easily.

Author's Purpose Reference Sheet:

A visual reference chart showing characteristics of different author purposes (inform, persuade, entertain) with examples of each type of evidence. This provides a visual support to compensate for auditory processing challenges and serves as a reference during the assessment.
