VERB + NOUN	VERB + INFINITIVE	
You need food to live.	You need to eat .	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Need is stronger than want.• Want gives the idea to wish for something.• Need gives the idea that something is very important.• Need and Want are followed by a noun or by an infinitive. <p>Infinitive = to + the simple form of a verb.</p>
I want an apple.	I want to eat an apple.
