

Countable and Uncountable Nouns

What are Countable Nouns?

Countable nouns are things we **can count** (1, 2, 3...). They have **singular and plural forms**.

Examples: one apple / two apples, a car / three cars.

We use: a / an / some / many / a few.

What are Uncountable Nouns?

Uncountable nouns are things we **cannot count individually**. They do **not have a plural form**.

Examples: water, rice, information, money.

We use: some / much / a little.
