The Javan rhinoceros, also known as the one-horned rhinoceros (*Rhinoceros sondaicus*), is one of the world's most endangered large mammals. Currently, its only remaining wild population is found in Ujung Kulon National Park, located on the westernmost tip of Java, Indonesia. This magnificent creature is characterized by its dusky grey skin and a single horn, which typically grows to about 25 centimeters in length. Unlike other rhino species, the Javan rhino's skin has loose folds that give it the appearance of wearing a suit of armor.

In the dense, tropical rainforests of Ujung Kulon, these rhinos lead a solitary and elusive life. They are herbivores, primarily feeding on shoots, twigs, and fallen fruits. Because they are extremely shy, they are rarely seen by humans, preferring to stay deep within the muddy wallows and thick vegetation. Their habitat provides the necessary water and salt licks essential for their survival, yet the restricted area makes the population highly vulnerable to natural disasters.

Despite conservation efforts, the Javan rhino faces several critical threats. The primary concern is the lack of habitat diversity and the risk of disease. Furthermore, Ujung Kulon is situated near Anak Krakatau, an active volcano. A major eruption or a tsunami could potentially wipe out the entire species in a single event. Additionally, the invasive *Arenga* palm tree is spreading rapidly across the park, crowding out the native plants that the rhinos rely on for food.

To save this species, the Indonesian government and international conservationists are working to expand the habitat and monitor the population using camera traps. There are discussions about establishing a second population in a different location to ensure that one catastrophe does not lead to extinction. Protecting the Javan rhino is not just about saving one animal; it is about preserving the biological heritage of Indonesia.

As climate change becomes an urgent global issue, the transition from internal combustion engines to electric vehicles (EVs) has gathered pace. Proponents of EVs argue that they are essential for reducing carbon emissions. Unlike traditional cars, EVs produce zero tailpipe emissions, which significantly improves air quality in urban areas. Furthermore, as renewable energy sources like solar and wind become more common, the overall carbon footprint of charging an EV continues to decrease.

On the economic side, EVs offer long-term savings. Although the initial purchase price is often higher than a gasoline car, the cost of electricity per kilometre is much lower than petrol. Additionally, EVs have fewer moving parts, meaning they require less frequent maintenance and no oil changes. This makes them an attractive option for budget-conscious drivers over the lifespan of the vehicle.

However, critics point out several significant drawbacks. The most prominent concern is "range anxiety"—the fear that the battery will run out before reaching a charging station. While the charging infrastructure is growing, it is still not as widespread as petrol stations, especially in rural areas. Furthermore, charging an EV takes significantly longer than filling a tank with gas, which can be inconvenient for long-distance travel.

Another major concern is the environmental impact of battery production. The mining of lithium and cobalt, essential components of EV batteries, often leads to habitat destruction and water pollution in developing countries. Moreover, the disposal of old batteries poses a potential toxic waste problem if not recycled properly.

In conclusion, while electric vehicles offer a promising path toward greener transportation, they are not a perfect solution. Improvements in battery technology, charging infrastructure, and ethical mining practices are necessary. Consumers must weigh the environmental benefits and fuel savings against the higher initial costs and current infrastructure limitations.

How to Bake a Classic Vanilla Sponge Cake

| • 2 tsp Vanilla extract | • Oven |
| • 2 tbsp Milk | |

Baking a sponge cake is a fundamental skill for any aspiring baker. This recipe yields one standard 8-inch round cake.

Steps:

1. Preheat your oven to 180°C (350°F). Grease the cake tin and line the bottom with baking paper.
2. In a large bowl, cream the softened butter and caster sugar together using the mixer until the mixture is pale and fluffy.
3. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition to ensure the mixture doesn't curdle. Stir in the vanilla extract.
4. Sift the flour and baking powder into the bowl. Use a spatula to gently fold the flour into the wet ingredients. Do not overmix, or the cake will be tough.
5. Add the milk and fold gently to loosen the batter.
6. Pour the batter into the prepared tin and smooth the top.
7. Bake for 20-25 minutes. To check if it's done, insert a toothpick into the centre; it should come out clean.
8. Cool in the tin for 10 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.
