

CASE 1: Store Incident

Police Report

On Friday evening, a small neighborhood convenience store closed later than usual. After closing, the owner discovered that a large amount of cash was missing from the register.

There were no signs of forced entry. The door and windows were intact, and nothing else in the store was damaged.

At the time, three people were inside the store: the cashier, a customer who stayed until closing time, and a delivery worker who was organizing products in the back.

The owner believes that the person responsible knew where the money was kept and how the store worked.

Suspects

- Cashier
- Customer
- Delivery Worker

Evidence

- No forced entry
- Money disappeared before closing
- The delivery worker knows the store well
- The customer left and returned

CASE 2: House Incident

Police Report

A woman reported that several valuable items were missing from her house, including jewelry and a laptop.

The incident happened during the afternoon while she was at work. When she returned home, everything looked normal—there were no broken windows or damaged doors.

Only a few people had access to the house: a close friend who visited earlier, a cleaner who works there twice a week, and a neighbor who sometimes helps with small tasks.

The police believe that the person responsible entered the house using a key.

Suspects

- Friend
- Cleaner
- Neighbor

Evidence

- No forced entry
- Cleaner has keys
- Friend knew where valuables were
- Items taken from bedroom

CASE 3: Company Incident

Police Report

A company discovered that a large amount of money had been transferred from its account to another account without permission.

The transaction was done during working hours using one of the office computers. There were no signs of hacking from outside the system.

Only three employees had access to the account information: the accountant, the manager, and an assistant.

The company believes that the person responsible understood how the system worked.

Suspects

- Accountant
- Manager
- Assistant

Evidence

- Correct password used
- Transaction done from office
- Assistant stayed late
- Accountant has full knowledge of system

CASE 4: School System Incident

Police Report

A school discovered that several student grades had been changed in the system overnight.

The changes were made using a valid password, and no external attack was detected.

Three students are being questioned: one is skilled with computers, another was at risk of failing, and a third had temporary access to a teacher's laptop.

The school wants to understand who accessed the system and why.

Suspects

- Leo
- Sara
- Mike

Evidence

- Changes made at night
- Valid password used
- Laptop was used recently
- Students knew which grades changed

CASE 5: Park Incident

Police Report

A young child disappeared from a park for a short time but was later found safe nearby.

The situation caused panic, but there were no signs of violence. The child said they went with someone they recognized.

At the time, three people were near the child: a babysitter, a neighbor, and a regular park visitor.

The police are trying to understand what happened and who was involved.

Suspects

- Babysitter
- Neighbor
- Park Visitor

Evidence

- No force used
- Child recognized the person
- Babysitter distracted
- Someone spoke to the child

CASE 6: School Property Incident

Police Report

One morning, school staff discovered that a wall had been painted with large messages during the night.

The paint covered a large area, and cleaning it would be expensive.

There were no witnesses, but security cameras showed a person near the school late at night.

Three students are suspected: one was seen near the school, another has a history of similar behavior, and a third said they saw someone running away.

Suspects

- Tom
- Alex
- Sofia

Evidence

- Paint on shoes
- Camera shows a person near the school
- Message written by hand
- Late night incident
