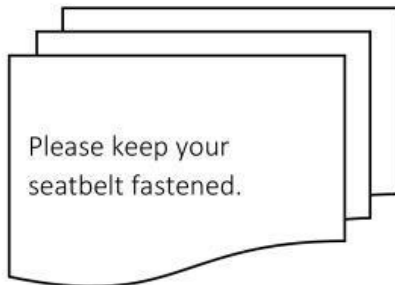

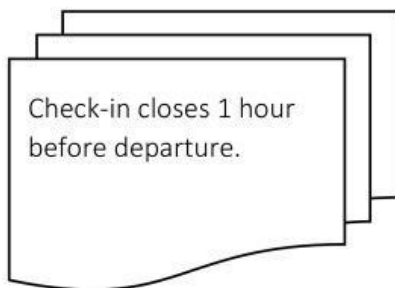

## Grammar Structures Explained

### 1. Passive Voice (Voz pasiva)

Used to focus on the action rather than the person who performs it.

- **Structure:** Subject + verb "to be" + past participle
- **Example:** "Career options are influenced by many factors."
- **Use:** when the doer is unknown or not important

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### 2. Connectors (Conectores)

Used to link ideas and show relationships between them.

- **Contrast:** *however, although, nevertheless*
  - Example: "Although it is difficult, students must decide."
- **Cause and result:** *therefore, as a result*
  - Example: "The market is competitive; therefore, skills are essential."
- **Alternative:** *instead*
  - Example: "Some choose passion; others choose stability instead."
- **Simultaneity:** *meanwhile*
  - Example: "Some students study; meanwhile, others work."

### 3. Modal Verbs (Modales)

Express possibility, obligation, or advice.

- **Should:** advice → *"Students should analyze their interests."*
- **Must:** obligation → *"You must consider your skills."*
- **Can:** ability/possibility → *"You can explore different careers."*

#### 4. Relative Clauses (Oraciones relativas)

Provide additional information about a noun.

- **Structure:** noun + who/which/that + clause
- Example: *"Students who plan carefully make better decisions."*

#### 5. Gerunds and Infinitives

Used after certain verbs.

- **Gerund (-ing):** *"Choosing a career is important."*
- **Infinitive (to + verb):** *"Students need to decide."*

#### 6. Present Perfect

Used to talk about experiences or actions connected to the present.

- **Structure:** have/has + past participle
- Example: *"Many students have changed their career paths."*

#### 7. Conditionals (First Conditional)

Used for real future possibilities.

- **Structure:** If + present simple, will + verb
- Example: *"If you study hard, you will succeed."*
