An earthquake is a sudden shaking of the ground caused by the release of energy in the Earth's lithosphere. While they can be terrifying and destructive, earthquakes are actually a natural

result of our planet's constant movement. To understand why they happen, we must look at the structure of the Earth's surface, which is broken into massive pieces called tectonic plates.

The Earth's outer shell is not one solid piece; it is like a giant jigsaw puzzle. These tectonic plates float on a semi-liquid layer of hot rock called the mantle. Because the mantle is constantly moving due to heat from the Earth's core, the plates on top move as well. However, they do not move smoothly. They move very slowly, usually only a few centimeters per year, which is about the same speed that your fingernails grow.

Earthquakes typically happen at the boundaries where these plates meet. There are three main types of movement. Sometimes plates pull apart, sometimes they crash into each other, and sometimes they slide past one another horizontally. Because the edges of the plates are rough, they often get stuck while the rest of the plate keeps moving. This creates a huge amount of pressure and "stress" at the boundary, which is called a fault line.

When the force of the movement finally overcomes the friction holding the plates in place, the rocks suddenly break or slip. This sudden movement releases a massive amount of energy in the form of seismic waves. These waves travel through the ground in all directions, causing the shaking that we feel as an earthquake. The point underground where the break starts is the focus, while the spot directly above it on the surface is the epicenter.

While the movie aims to promote nationalism and teamwork, the execution has sparked a lot of intense debate among Indonesian netizens.

On the positive side, the story's intention is noble. It tries to teach the younger generation about the importance of unity and love for the country. The voice acting is also quite decent, and the music helps to build a patriotic atmosphere. For young children, the simple plot might be entertaining and easy to follow.

Unfortunately, the movie suffers from significant technical issues. Many viewers criticized the animation quality, which looks stiff and outdated compared to other modern Indonesian animations like *Jumbo* or *Nussa*. The graphics often look like unfinished school projects, which is disappointing considering the reported budget of billions of rupiah. Furthermore, netizens discovered that several character models were likely pre-made assets from the internet rather than original designs, leading to accusations of lack of creativity.

The creators need to focus much more on technical details and visual consistency in the future.
