GRAMMAR FOCUS

Describing what you can see or hear

We use these structures in English to describe a scene – what is happening around you right now.

KEY STRUCTURES

There is / There are + noun + -ing verb

*There's a **dog barking** outside.*

*There are **some children playing** in the garden.*

I can see / hear / feel / smell + noun + -ing verb

*I can see a **man reading** a newspaper.*

*I can hear **someone singing** upstairs.*

⚠ We use -ing, NOT the infinitive, after these structures.

X *There's a car to stop by the gate.* **✓** *There's a car stopping by the gate.*
