The 4 Levels of Reading Comprehension

1. Literal Comprehension

Understanding information that is directly stated in the text.

2. Inferential Comprehension

Using clues from the text and prior knowledge to make logical guesses or conclusions.

3. Critical Comprehension

Judging and evaluating what you read by forming opinions and analyzing information.

4. Applied Comprehension

Using information from the text in real-life situations or connecting it to personal experiences.
